**To the Reverend Clergy and Faithful of the

Dearly beloved:

Christ is risen!

(Saint Nikolai was consecrated as a bishop of the Serbian Orthodox Church before World War II. He was arrested by the Nazis during their occupation of Yugoslavia, and spent the war as a prisoner at Dachau concentration camp. After the Communist takeover of his country, he was exiled and spent his last years at Saint Tikhon Monastery in South Canaan, Pennsylvania. He fell asleep in the Lord in 1956.)

Bless my enemies, O Lord. Even I bless them and do not curse them.

Enemies have driven me into Thy embrace more than friends have.

Friends have bound me to earth, enemies have loosed me from earth and have demolished all my aspirations in the world.

Enemies have made me a stranger in worldly realms and an extraneous inhabitant of the world.

Just as a hunted animal finds safer shelter than an unhunted animal does, so have I, persecuted by enemies, found the safest sanctuary, having ensconced myself beneath Thy tabernacle, where neither friends nor enemies can slay my soul.

Truly, enemies have cut me loose from the world and have stretched out my hands to the hem of Thy garment.

Enemies have taught me to know what hardly anyone knows, that a person has no enemies in the world except himself.

One hates his enemies only when he fails to realize that they are not enemies, but cruel friends.

It is truly difficult for me to say who has done me more good and who has done me more evil in the world: friends or enemies.

Therefore bless, O Lord, both my friends and my enemies.

A slave curses enemies, for he does not understand.

But a son blesses them, for he understands. For a son knows that his enemies cannot touch his life. Therefore he freely steps among them and prays to God for them.

Bless my enemies, O Lord. Even I bless them and do not curse them. Amen.



Help needed to complete new church

In September 2004, His Beatitude, Metropolitan Herman, together with His Grace, Bishop Seraphim, and His Grace, Bishop Nikon, made his first official visit as Primate to the Church of the Czech Lands and Slovakia. One of his stops was my former parish of the Ascension of the Lord, in Strazske, Slovakia.

From my humble personal perspective, the history of Orthodoxy in Slovakia began in 1950 when over 100 Greek Catholic (Uniate) priests with their parishes in a "Sobor" held in Presov decided to return to their mother Orthodox Church.

For nineteen years (1950-1969), the Orthodox Church in Slovakia enjoyed the freedom to grow and attract the Orthodox faithful. In 1969, the Czechoslovak government arbitrarily imposed by force a draconian decree that all the churches (which included the property of the church sites themselves including attached parish houses serving those churches) who returned to the Orthodox fold in 1950 were now instantaneously "Greek Catholic."

Thousands of faithful, practicing Orthodox Christians found their churches shuttered or they suffered physical violence as victims of hostile takeovers of their beloved parishes. As parish priest of the Ascension of the Lord Church in Strazske, I unfortunately was brutally and physically removed from the church grounds and my flock was violently dispossessed of their church by a mob armed with sticks and fists.

In looking back, I can only thank God for guiding me in my decision in 1965 to help construct a new parish house. That house became the physical and spiritual refuge of my flock. This small one family parish house became our church home through sheer necessity at that time, and to this day is still where Divine Liturgy is served.

Recently, I received a letter from the current pastor of The Ascension of the Lord Church in Strazske, Father

Michael Dzugan. He informed me that the city of Strazske had offered the parish a most beautiful piece of property for the express purpose of building a new church. The cost of this parcel of property was one Slovak Kron (about two cents in today's US dollar equivalent).

As of today, a foundation has been put into place for the new Ascension of the Lord church building, over which His Beatitude, Metropolitan Herman and his delegation visited and prayed for a successful completion.

Father Dzugan has impressed me with his examples of the determination and the sheer will of his parishioners to build their church to the glory of God largely through their own means. But in a country of 36% unemployment, help from our Orthodox brothers and sisters abroad is needed for this God-given work of love to succeed.

As Jesus has taught us, "In as much as you have done it to one of the least of these my brethren, you have done it to me." (Matthew 25:40) Your offering shows that from what is yours, you were able to share with us. You will always remain in our prayers. "My house shall be called a house of prayer." (Matthew 21:13).

Would you please help me to finish building this beautiful church? It is for my spiritual children whom I served for many years before coming to the USA in 1970. These are the very same children whom I taught in religious classes in public schools thirty-five years ago. They have grown up to become fathers and mothers with their own children today. They are my spiritual children who now have written and call upon me: "Dear Father Jozef, please help us to finish construction of our church."

My beloved brothers and sisters in Christ, will you not also hear their voices and help? May all of God's blessings be upon you and may you be rewarded ten-fold for your generosity.

New Britain parishioner memorialized





From Pascha to Pentecost:
Reflections on the Gospel of John by
Fr. William C. Mills
